Our doors remained open during the entire 2021 year to support the children with academic help, social interaction, nutritious food, and exciting Bible lessons. Wesley Chapel Mission Center continues to expand horizons by taking the children on Discovery trips to museums, parks, and fun activities. With a tremendous funding gift from the City of Cincinnati, we initiated a new Technology program to expose the children to robotics and computer programming. We modified our programming hours for the High School program to accommodate a later schedule for Cincinnati Public Schools. Volunteers from the University of Cincinnati, churches, local high schools, and other organizations enabled us to provide the children with one-to-one homework help and well-supervised activities. ## **Addressing Community Challenges**



During what some may say are the most unfortunate times, Wesley Chapel Mission Center continues to minister to our Over-the-Rhine children and families by demonstrating God's unconditional love. At WCMC, we believe that having a strong relationship with the children, families, schools, and community leaders allows us to better understand the needs of Over-the-Rhine. Embedding ourselves in the community allows our OTR neighbors to share their struggles and victories with us. WCMC continues to be a beacon of light and hope by finding creative ways to address the children's needs to bring healing and wholeness.

While our partner schools, Rothenberg Preparatory Academy and St. Francis Seraph, reduced classroom time during the pandemic Wesley Chapel Mission Center accepted the call to support children and families. In 2021 we increased the number of children we served to 70 daily average. Many families sought our services, resulting in a waitlist for the second year in a row. Our services are limited by physical space as well as staffing. To close the achievement gap, we focused on providing academic enrichment to our students, also addressing specific social problems children in the community face.

The non-profit Wesley Chapel Mission Center is open to approximately 400 PreK-12th grade children who live between 13th Street and East Clifton Avenue and Elm and Sycamore Streets in Over the Rhine. 90% of our students have single-parent homes, while 100% receive public assistance to meet their basic needs. The median family income is \$13,488.

We continued tutoring students during one of the most challenging academic school years. In Over-the-Rhine, we were able to help students with virtual/hybrid learning. When the local school district was closed, we continued to open our doors to help support families in the community. Wesley Chapel Mission Center fed students a healthy snack every day. We served a variety of healthy snacks, encouraging students to try a new food each week.

# Technology

To help combat the challenges students face academically, WCMC provides an extra level of support to students in Over-the-Rhine. In the fall of 2021, we launched our new Technology Camp which introduces students to coding, robotics, drones, video editing, and green screens.



Through technology, students develop better critical thinking skills and comprehension. Learning with technology also helps support other areas of learning like math, science, and reading. Michael Beck, founder of Code for Kids and passionate community volunteer, leads this camp every Tuesday and Thursday from 4:30 pm to 5:30 pm.



The Technology Camp has inspired students to think about careers in science and engineering. Senior Anastasia James said, "It's like a euphoria moment; it was really great, and it made me really think about going into engineering and robotics as a major in college."

We are excited to find new and innovative ways to engage with our students using technology. With the \$50,000 grant we were awarded from the City of Cincinnati, we have provided new iPads and cases for students to use. Also, all new up-to-date equipment to support our new Media Camp starting in the summer of 2022, with cameras, lights, microphones, green screens, and more.



## Staff

Wesley Chapel Mission Center is sometimes the only place some students hear and talk about God. Our kids feel safe and comfortable talking to us about their faith. At WCMC, we champion our students to grow in faith, hope, and love. We envision that what our students learn at WCMC, they, in turn, take with them into their homes, to school, the community, and beyond. It is a true blessing to have students yearning to develop and grow in ways that positively impact their neighborhood. True transformation doesn't start and stop in the four walls of our facility; it goes abroad.

In 2021, we continued our partnership with the University of Cincinnati. Shruti Mishra, a senior in the Medical Science program, committed at least 10 hours per week to programming.

To help support our K-6th grade students in reading, we began using DIBLES (Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills) to measure and assess the kids in our program on their literacy skills. Shruti helped in our efforts by testing students, then organizing, and documenting results.





As a future doctor, volunteering at WCMC has allowed her to see how much of an impact she can make that will best serve her prospective patients. Growing up in Cincinnati and a graduate of Sycamore High School, Shruti felt that volunteering at WCMC allowed her to see firsthand the similarities and differences that many of the children in Over-the-Rhine face compared to herself growing up.
